





I-RIDE Trolley

Symbolizing its role as a true destination, the International Drive Resort Area offers its guests a certain amenity with all the bells and whistles: the exclusive, convenient, and cost-saving I-RIDE Trolley Service.

These fun and festive trolleys combine a little charm of the past with modern day air conditioning. The I-RIDE Trolleys are your most convenient transportation for hundreds of exciting destinations.

Where Does the I-RIDE Trolley Go?

The I-RIDE Trolleys travel exclusively throughout the International Drive Area. The Main Line begins at the north end in the Major Boulevard area. It travels the majority of International Drive and services the south International Drive Resort area as well with 78 convenient stops. The Green Line begins and ends on International Drive but primarily travels along Universal Boulevard with 15 convenient stops.

When Does the I-RIDE Trolley Operate?

I-RIDE Trolleys operate year-round, seven days a week, from 8:00 a.m. - 10:30 p.m.

Who Can Ride the I-RIDE Trolley?

Everyone! I-RIDE Trolleys seat 41 riders, 54 total capacity, including two wheelchair positions and an ADA-specified hydraulic lift system (weight limitations apply).

How Much Does it Cost to Ride the I-RIDE Trolley?

Cash Fare


- Single fare is \$1.25
- Senior citizen (65 and over) fare is \$.25
- All children age 12 and under RIDE FREE when accompanied by a paying adult
- Exact change is required, \$1.00 accepted
- Drivers do not carry cash

Unlimited Ride Passes

- One-Day Pass: \$4.00 per person
- Three-Day Pass: \$6.00 per person
- Five-Day Pass: \$8.00 per person
- Seven-Day Pass: \$10.00 per person
- Fourteen-Day Pass: \$17.00 per person

Passes not sold on Trolleys. Passes are available at over 65 locations within the International Drive Resort Area and from the I-RIDE sales office. Trolley transfers are FREE and a transfer coupon is not required if you have an Unlimited Ride Pass. With cash fare, just ask your Trolley driver for a transfer coupon when you board the trolley.







MAIN FUNCTIONS

Training Officers

Training Officers provide local, regional and national training on a wide variety of TIV topics. Training venues include financial aid associations, state organizations, Department of Education national conferences, Department of Education online training, and fundamental workshops for new schools and financial aid staff. In addition, training officers provide direct assistance to schools by answering questions, conducting research and distributing information.

Though training officers train on a national scope, each training officer resides in a particular region made up of specific states. Due to state and school system differences, concentration of certain types of institutions and general workload issues, we encourage schools to contact those training officers located in their respective region for assistance.

Institutional Improvement Specialists

Institutional Improvement Specialists (IIS) are part of the School Participation Team (SPT). The SPTs work with institutional eligibility, resolve institutional independent audits, review school financial statements, conduct TIV program reviews, and provide technical assistance.

IIS also work within regions and are primarily responsible for working with all new schools participating in federal Title IV aid that reside in specific states. They conduct technical assistance visits (on-site and off-site), provide one-on-one training, and help with general TIV questions. In addition, they may work closely with schools to resolve eligibility, audit and/or financial concerns.

*Regions and states may differ between Training Officers and Institutional Improvement Specialists



THE FINANCIAL AID PROCESS

Finding financial aid can seem overwhelming when you're trying to get ready for college or career school. The U.S. Department of Education's Office of Federal Student Aid is here to help you get the money you need to pay for your education.

PREPARATION

Start early. Begin coming early. START SAVINGS SCHOLARSHIPS STATE AID

Many states have savings funding programs. Ask a guidance counselor or your savings financial aid office for more information.

Look for scholarships through your state or through an employer, religious, and community organization.

FAFSA

It's time to apply for financial aid.

The FAFSA is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and is the only way to apply for federal student aid. The schools you will use your financial aid will use FAFSA information to evaluate your financial need and determine how much federal aid you are eligible to receive. Many states and colleges also use information from your FAFSA to provide their own financial aid.

Each January the FAFSA is available for the upcoming school year. It is best to fill it out as early as you can because some aid is first come, first served.

When you complete the FAFSA, you'll need to provide personal and financial information. If you've had your taxes already, you may be able to automatically withdraw the information from the IRS. If you haven't, just estimate your tax information and update it later.

Complete the FAFSA online at www.fafsa.gov. Make sure to fill out and submit the FAFSA each year you are in college.

After you submit your FAFSA, you'll receive your Student Aid Report (SAR). Your SAR summarizes the information in your FAFSA. Review it and make corrections if needed.

Your FAFSA helps your school determine the types of federal student aid you are eligible to receive.

TYPES OF FEDERAL STUDENT AID

As the largest provider of financial aid, the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Federal Student Aid provides grants, loans, and work-study funds.

Grants and scholarships that do not have to be repaid.

Student loans are your money that is loaned to you and must be repaid with interest.

Work-study jobs give you the opportunity to earn money to help pay educational expenses.

AWARD

The awarder reviews the combination of federal grants, loans, and work-study to determine what to offer you. The offer might also contain state and institutional aid. If you receive several offers from multiple colleges or career schools, you should compare them and decide which offer gives you the most money.

COLLEGE

Every year, millions of new students attend college or career school for the first time. Your savings or parent school has a financial aid office to help guide you along the way.

BEYOND EDUCATION

WORKFORCE
When you leave the classroom for your education and get Federal Student Aid, help you along the way by setting the foundation for a bright future and success in the workforce.

REPAYMENT
Once you leave school, you will need to repay your student loans. Contact your loan servicer to discuss your repayment options.

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
